- The students feel the need to enhance the number of seats in the hostels and construction of a ladies' hostel.
- The students also sought in their response the construction of more toilets and upgradation of playground.

Annexure-III

Best Practice-I

Health Check-up camp

GOAL: A healthy body along with a healthy mind is indispensable for carrying out any activity in an academic institution. Keeping this fact in view the institution organizes biennial health check-up camps to keep the students hale and hearty.

CONTEXT: Since most of the students come from a weaker socio-economic background they are not conscious about maintaining a proper physical health. The College invites specialist medicos to check the health of the students to facilitate eye check-up, routine blood test, ENT check-up and dental hygiene. Counselling is also taken up to make the students aware regarding harmful effects of tobacco, gutkha, smoking and drug abuse.

EVIDENCE: Many students have shown keen interest and attend the health camp in large number. It has a positive impact on the health of the students.

CHALLENGES: The health camp cannot be done frequently due to resource crunch. Some students are reluctant to consult doctors due to inherent fear psychosis of being detected with a disease.

Best Practice-II

Self defence training programme for girls

GOAL: In order to empower the girl students to identify the looming danger and to act with confidence to defend oneself. This training enhances the fighting skill which instills the confidence to face untoward incidence.

CONTEXT: It has been not uncommon in the contemporary society that very often women are subjected to staking eve-teasing, sexual abuse, voyeurism and domestic violence. To get rid of this harassment the state Govt. has introduced a flagship program of imparting self-defence training for girls in different Colleges.

PRACTICE: Christ College, Cuttack being the sub-nodal College undertake the responsibility of imparting self-defence training to its girl students along with five other nearby Colleges namely; ABIT, INDIGO College of Science and Commerce, IPSAR College, Mahanadi Vihar Women's College, SIMS College.

EVIDENCE: During this academic session 60 numbers of girl students from this College have been trained by the master trainer Mrs. Subhashree Lenka of Raghunath Jew College, Cuttack.

CHALLENGES: It is difficult to get hold of adequate number of trained instructors. Even though the girls are trained they may not sustain same kind of ability to apply the skill in the future as the training is short term in nature. There is a lack of perceptible psychological motivation along with the physical training.
